M3900 series general description

Purpose

This chapter introduces you to the M3900 series digital telephones.

Introduction

The M3900 sets provide integrated voice and data communication. The M3900 sets communicate with the Meridian SL-100 switch through digital transmission over standard twisted-pair wiring.

The five models of the M3900 series telephones include the M3901, M3902, M3903, M3904, and M3905. Each of the M3900 sets have specific characteristics and support features using the following keys:

- fixed feature
- programmable line/feature (self-labeled)
- programmable feature (self-labeled)
- context sensitive softkeys

Minimum firmware requirements

The M3900 Release 3 telephone sets supported on the Meridian SL-100 require the following Release 3 firmware:

- M3902 Firmware version 8.0
- M3903 Firmware version 8.0
- M3904 Firmware version 8.2
- M3905 Firmware version 8.1

For information about how to obtain the latest firmware files, see [“Features, firmware, and software management” on page 101](#).

Note: If you are using the Full Duplex Handsfree accessory with the M3904, the minimum firmware version is 8.3.

Due to several improvements made with M3900 Release 3 firmware and XPM 17, when you upgrade sites to XPM 17 all M3900 telephones

must have Release 3 firmware. If your site has any M3900s with Release 2 firmware, you can download the Release 3 firmware from Nortel Networks web site at <http://nortelnetworks.com>. Select “Customer Support”. If you are not a registered user, follow the option for customers to register for access. Only registered users can download the firmware. For more information, see [“Features, firmware, and software management” on page 101](#).

The Display-based Expansion Module (DBA), and the Key-based Expansion Module (KBA) require a minimum firmware release as follows:

- **Display-based Expansion Module** – Release 6 of NTMN67AA or later
- **Key-based Expansion Module** – Release 2 of NTMN37BA or later

Minimum EIPE load requirements

The M3900 Release 3 telephones require a minimum of EIPE15AD.

Programmable line/feature keys (self-labeled)

The programmable line/feature keys (self-labeled) are located at the left and right sides of the upper section of the display area on the M3903, M3904, and M3905 telephone sets. The user changes the LCD label of these keys (except the primary directory number key) to meet their business needs.

The M3903 and M3904 sets provide two layers of functionality using these keys. The user accesses two Lines/Features per key. The M3904 provides the user with 12 lines/features that are accessible on the six keys. The M3903 provides users with four lines/features that are accessible on the two keys. The M3905 provides one layer of keys with eight line/feature keys.

Programmable feature keys (self-labeled)

Programmable feature keys (self-labeled) are the three keys located below the lower portion of the display area on the M3902 Meridian digital telephone.

Context-sensitive softkeys

The M3903, M3904, and M3905 have four softkeys directly below the display. Only the features that are configured for the telephone set display on the soft labels above the keys. For example, features like transfer and conference can be accessed during a call, but not Forward because that feature is not needed during a call. You can access the following functions or features using these keys:

- features configured for the telephone set
- phone status like on-hook, off-hook, or on a call
- options list, directory/log, or applications usage indication

Release 3 enhancements

Full Duplex Handsfree capability

The Full Duplex Handsfree (FDHF) functionality allows simultaneous, two-way communications during a handsfree call. For Full Duplex Handsfree functionality, you require an M3904 Release 3 telephone set equipped with an FDHF cartridge accessory. For hardware requirements information, see [“Full Duplex Handsfree Accessory” on page 72](#).

The set attenuates the receive audio level during FDHF mode while both parties are speaking. Therefore, there can be fluctuations in the receive volume during an FDHF call. During the call, you can insert or remove the FDHF cartridge from the Accessory Connection Module (ACM) without interrupting the established call. If you remove the FDHF cartridge, the set restores half duplex operation.

One-button feature access keys

M3900 Release 3 firmware and MSL15 or later software introduces the following enhancements for Personal Directory, Corporate Directory, Call Log, and Redial List:

- The user can press the Directory/Log key and start a directory search through the dial pad without pressing the Select softkey. Searches can now be made with three letters, rather than only one.
- Instead of needing two key strokes with Corporate Directory, the user presses the Applications keys and enters letters using the dial pad to begin a search.
- Call Log and Redial List can be datafilled as either context-sensitive softkeys or programmable feature keys.

Pause in Dialing Strings

This feature enables the user to enter a 1.5-second delay in the dialing sequence on an external line. The sets use the delay for applications such as answering machines, IVR systems, auto attendant, when programming or editing their Personal Directory or Redial List. A new softkey, labeled "Pause", appears on the M3903, M3904, and M3905 telephone sets.

This feature introduces a Pause softkey. To enter a Pause in the dialing string while editing a number, press the Pause softkey. A Pause place marker appears in the dialing string.

The pause character is two parallel bars (||) that appear in the dialing display. You can insert additional pauses (for example, four pauses = 4 x 1.5 sec. = 6-sec. delay.) This feature is supported when using the Release 3 PC utility, NTMN82AB or later.

Call Forward enhancement

The Call Forward Enhancement feature modifies the method of activating Call Forward on M3903, M3904, and M3905 sets.

To forward your calls, or change a previously stored Call Forward number, follow the steps in Procedure 1.

Procedure 1

Use Call Forward on M3903, M3904, and M3905 sets

- 1 Press the **Call Forward** Key.
The previously stored Call Forward number appears, if one exists.
- 2 If you want to keep the previously stored Call Forward number, press **Done**. If you want to enter a new Call Forward number, go to Step 3.
- 3 Enter the Call Forward number and press **Done**.

When you start to enter the new number, the set automatically deletes the initial Call Forward Number.

This procedure is now complete

Note: If you use Remote Call Forward to change the call forward number, the number that appears on the display of the telephone set is the last number entered directly from the telephone set. Currently, there is no plan to change this.

Special Character handling

Users can enter Special Characters, like those on a PC keyboard for the ASCII character set, to items such as the personal directory or feature key labels. The Special Character set contains up to 130 characters. In the edit mode, navigation keys access the special characters.

31-Digit Dialing

With the 31-Digit Dialing feature, M3900 display screens accommodate dialing strings of up to 31 digits. This allows the screens to fully display long dialing strings, such as calling card numbers and access codes.

The M3902 set has a one-line display. Use the Left/Right navigation keys to scroll through the digits on the line.

M3903, M3904, and M3905 display screens accommodate 24 characters on each line. For dialing strings greater than 24 characters, the number automatically wraps to the second line.

Secondary DN dialing with Directories

This feature introduces the ability to dial out on secondary DNs when using the Personal Directory, Call Log, Redial List, and Corporate Directory Application.

Personal Directory, Call Log, and Redial

If there is a call on a primary DN, or the set is configured as an ACD Call Center telephone, use the following procedures to dial out on the secondary DN.

Procedure 2

Dial out on secondary DNs using Personal Directory, Call Log, and Redial – M3904

- 1 Press the **Directory/Log** Key, select the Personal Directory, and select the entry.
- 2 Press the **secondary DN** key and then the **dial** softkey.

The M3904 dials the number.

Note: If you press the **dial** softkey prior to pressing the **secondary DN** key, the M3904 displays “Unable to Dial – Busy Primary Line”.

This procedure is now complete

Procedure 3

Dial out on secondary DNs using Personal Directory, Call Log, and Redial – M3905

- 1 Press the **Dir/Log** key or the Callers or Redial List and select the entry.
- 2 Press the **dial** softkey.

The M3905 displays “Select Free Line”. Your site must be on MSL15 (or higher) and the patch ID DMX12 applied.

- 3 Press a **secondary DN** key, press “OK”, and press the **dial** softkey again.

The M3905 dials the number.

Note: If your site is not yet on MSL15, the M3905 will not display the message; however, you use the same steps to dial the number.

This procedure is now complete

Corporate Directory

If there is a call on a primary DN, or the set is configured as an ACD Call Center telephone, use the following procedures to dial out on the secondary DN.

Procedure 4

Dial out on secondary DNs using Corporate Directory – M3903 and M3904

- 1 Press the **Applications** Key, select Corporate Directory, and select the entry.
- 2 Press the **secondary DN** key and then press the **dial** softkey.

The M3903/M3904 dials the number.

Note: If you press the **dial** softkey prior to pressing the **secondary DN** key, the set will not dial the call, and it will cancel hold for the call that is on the primary DN.

This procedure is now complete

Procedure 5

Dial out on secondary DNs using Corporate Directory – M3905

- 1 Press the **Applications** key, select Corporate Directory and select the entry.
- 2 Press the **dial** softkey, then press a **secondary DN** key.

The M3905 dials the call.

This procedure is now complete

Password clear

Administrators can clear and reset the Directory/Call Log password. Turn off the password by using Password Clear.

Full icon support

This feature enables the M3902, M3903, and M3905 sets to use the icons with I-Ringing, I-Active, U-Active, I-Hold, and U-Hold.

Service orders

M3900 Release 3 firmware and MSL15 software introduce two new options: RDLL (Redial List) and CLLG (Call Log.) For detailed examples of adding the M3900 sets using SERVORD, refer to the *Service Order Reference Manual*.

Flash download

Flash download provides the capability to download a new firmware version from the Meridian SL-100 switch to the Meridian digital telephones to:

- support a new language
- add new text prompts and soft-labels for feature and softkeys
- add new firmware-based applications
- support new signaling messages for server-based applications
- fix customer reported problems

Optivity Telephony Manager for Meridian SL-100 2.0

The Optivity Telephony Manager for Meridian SL-100 (OTM-MSL), version 2.0 or greater, initiates all flash download commands. OTM-MSL provides the ability to:

- query the current firmware version residing on Meridian digital telephones
- initiate flash download on M3900 sets on a set-by-set basis (that is, you can schedule downloads for a series of phones; downloads can occur during any time range, on any date)

- initiate flash download for all Meridian digital telephones configured on an IPE peripheral equipped with an extended peripheral equipment controller (EXPEC), NT7D07BA or later vintage
- keep track of download progress, and manage the correlation of firmware files for the different sets
- log download failures and provide a record of completed or failed downloads
- abort a download

Note: M3900 sets require an intelligent peripheral equipment (IPE) equipped with an EXPEC, NT7D07BA or later version.

Interactions and restrictions

During the download process, the M3900 sets are in an inoperable state. The sets display a message indicating that a download is in progress. If a download fails, the display indicates that maintenance is required.

In cases where there is an IPE equipped with an EXPEC and both M3900 and M2000 series sets coexist, the M2000 sets continue to operate during the flash download process.

Meridian Digital Group Listening (GLISTEN)

Use the GLISTEN feature to activate the loudspeaker on the set when the handset is in use. A group of people can listen to the audio, but only the handset transmits audio to the far end. Group listening differs from handsfree in that the set enables the loudspeaker, but not the handsfree microphone. The handset is off-hook and its audio paths are on.

The GLISTEN feature is only available when enabled, and when assigned to the set through SERVORD. When this feature is not available, it does not show up in the options menu lists. In addition, because handsfree and group listening cannot be in activation at the same time, the group listening enable feature is not in the options list if there is an active call with handsfree enabled.

In order to use the GLISTEN feature, the user must first enable the feature by using the Options mode. When the feature is enabled, the handsfree key can turn the speaker on or off. To turn off the speaker, the user must press the Handsfree key a second time. The speaker only turns on if the handset is off-hook. The speaker automatically turns off when the handset is placed on-hook.

To activate handsfree when group listening is in use, the user must press and hold the Handsfree key, place the handset on-hook, and release the handsfree key. Alternately, the user can place the call on hold by pressing the Hold key, place the handset on-hook, followed by pressing the DN key that has the held call.

Note: You must enable handsfree for group listening to be enabled.

Interactions

GLISTEN is assignable to M3902, M3903, and M3904 sets using SERVORD commands NEW, NEWACD, ADD, and EST. Use the SERVORD CHF command to toggle the status of the option to an existing set previously listed. When you provision the options through SERVORD, the user can access the GLISTEN feature with the options key.

Data schema

Table IVDINV has set refinements added with GLISTEN as a boolean field. Refer to the *Customer Data Schema Reference Manual* for more information.

Password reset

The M3903, M3904, and M3905 sets provide password reset capability to directories that can be password protected.

The M3903 set uses password reset for the call log/redial fixed feature key. The call log/redial key allows access to the call log and the redial list.

The M3904 set uses password reset for the directory/log fixed feature key. The directory/log key allows access to set-based applications, such as personal directory, call log, and redial list.

The switch administrator performs password reset using the command interface (CI) command, RESETPWD. If a user forgets the password, the RESETPWD command resets the password for all directories.

When you perform Password Reset on a terminal with password protection enabled, the user must enter the new password to gain access to a list.

After performing password reset on a terminal with password protection disabled, the user enters the new password the next time password protection is enabled. Use the RESETPWD command to assign the new password.

Note: With M3900 Release 3, the administrator can disable the password functionality using the Password Clear enhancement by entering “00000000” (that is, eight zeros), instead of a new password. The user then will not be required to enter a password.

Desktop directory number download

The Meridian digital telephones display the DN associated with a DN key or the feature assigned to a feature key on a display area next to each of their keys. This display area eliminates the need for paper labels. The directory download occurs when you provision new DNs on the set or add new features.

Limitations and restrictions

DN download and feature key labeling only apply to Meridian digital telephones equipped with a display. The M3902, M3903, M3904, M3905, and the DBA use this function. The M3901 set does not use this function.

The M3902 set has a 2 x 24 character display. The keys for DN features have enough space for seven characters for both DN and features.

The M3903 set has a 3 x 24 character display. The keys for feature keys are limited to 10 characters.

The M3904 set has a 5 x 24 character display. The keys for features are limited to 10 characters.

The M3905 set has a 4 x 24 display. The keys for features are limited to 10 characters.

The M3904 and M3905 sets support a maximum of two KBAs or one DBA. A set that has at least one KBA cannot have a DBA and vice versa.

Interactions

The analog terminal adapter (ATA) functions with the M3900 sets.

Data schema

Refer to the *Customer Data Schema Reference Manual* for more information.



Feature keys

Purpose

This chapter describes the look and functions of the feature keys.

Fixed feature keys

The M3900 Series Meridian Digital Telephone sets have feature keys that are pre-labeled with the assigned feature. These keys appear on the telephone with text or icon labels. Telephone icon key labels are available in specific markets. An asterisk (*) indicates optional key caps available with the M3905. Table 2 shows the keys, text, and icons.

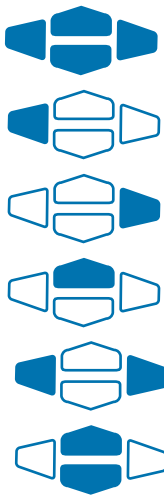

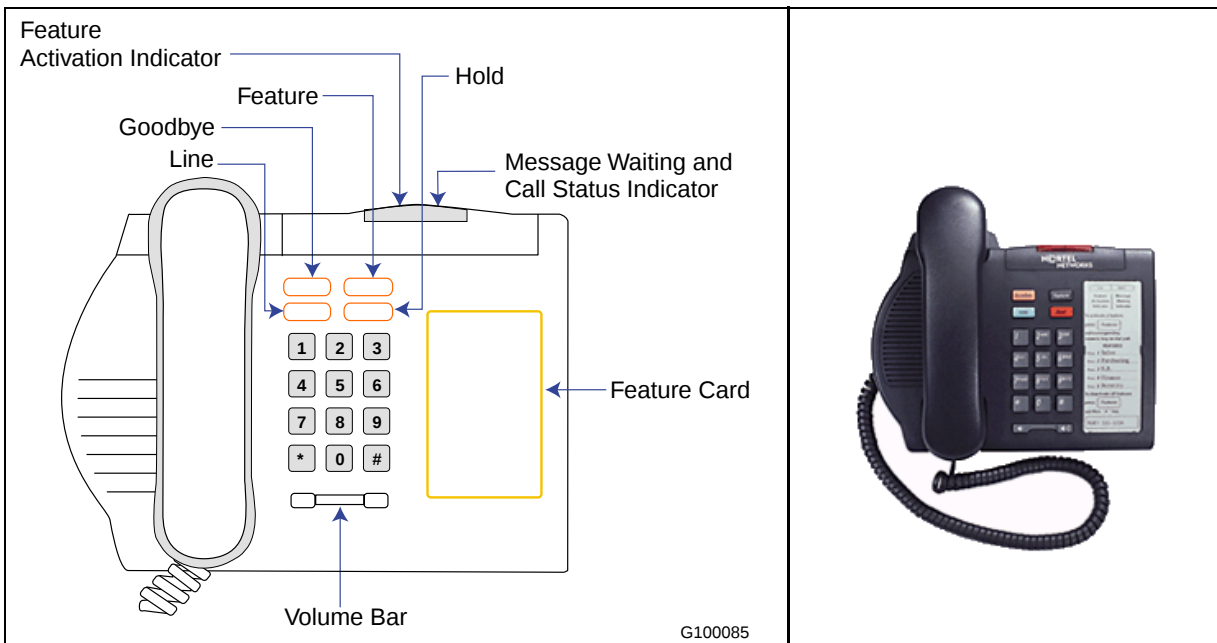

Message Waiting and Call Status Indicator (MWI)

The MWI LED lights to show a message is waiting. This indicator visually alerts that a call is holding. The LED flashes to indicate an incoming call. It winks when a call is holding.

Feature Activation Indicator (FAI)

The Feature Activation Indicator LED indicator displays the status of all five programmable feature keys (keys 2-6). The Feature Activation Indicator LED is located on the left side of the MWI. The MWI and Feature Activation Indicator LED use the same lens with a separating wall. The Feature Activation Indicator LED turns off when all five programmable keys turn off. The LED winks when any one of the five keys wink. The Feature Activation Indicator LED turns on when any of the five keys turns on.

Line key

Use the Line key for on-hook dialing or to take a call off hold. Access the DN by taking the handset off-hook or by pressing the Line key. The DN must be assigned to key 1.

Goodbye key

Use the Goodbye key to terminate an active call.

Hold key

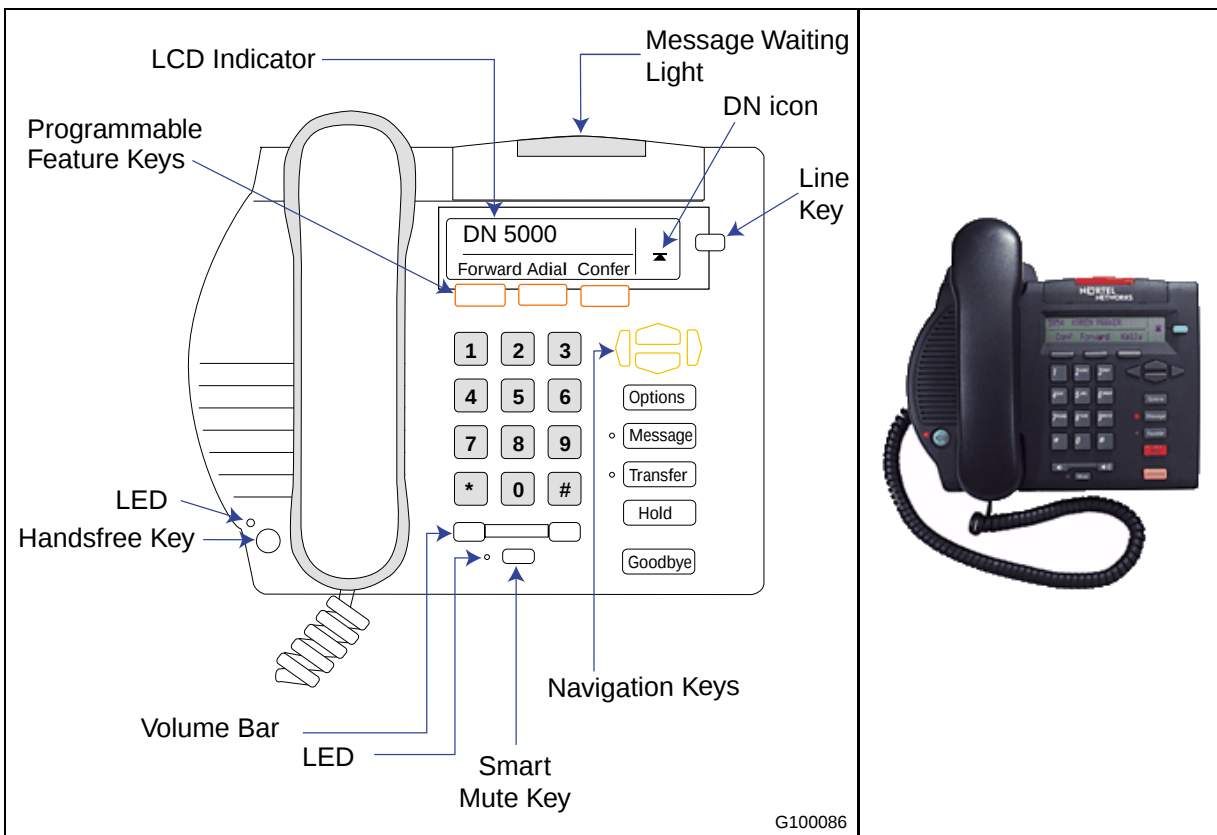

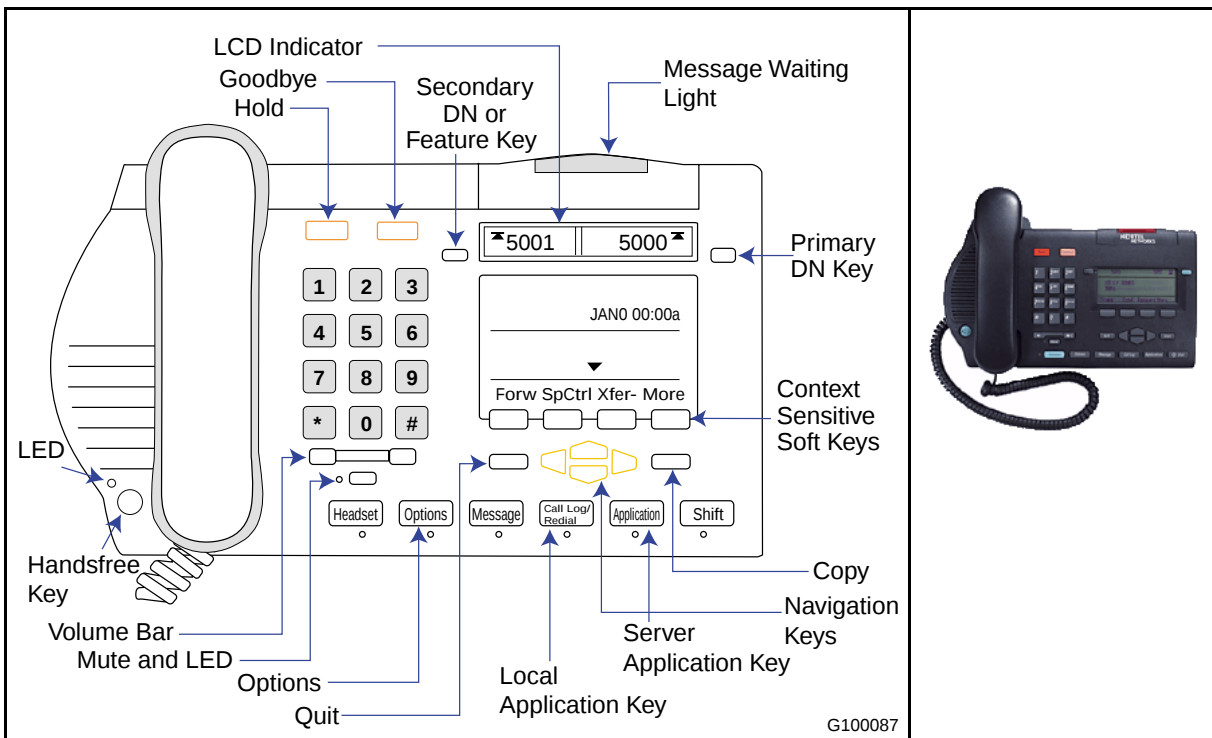

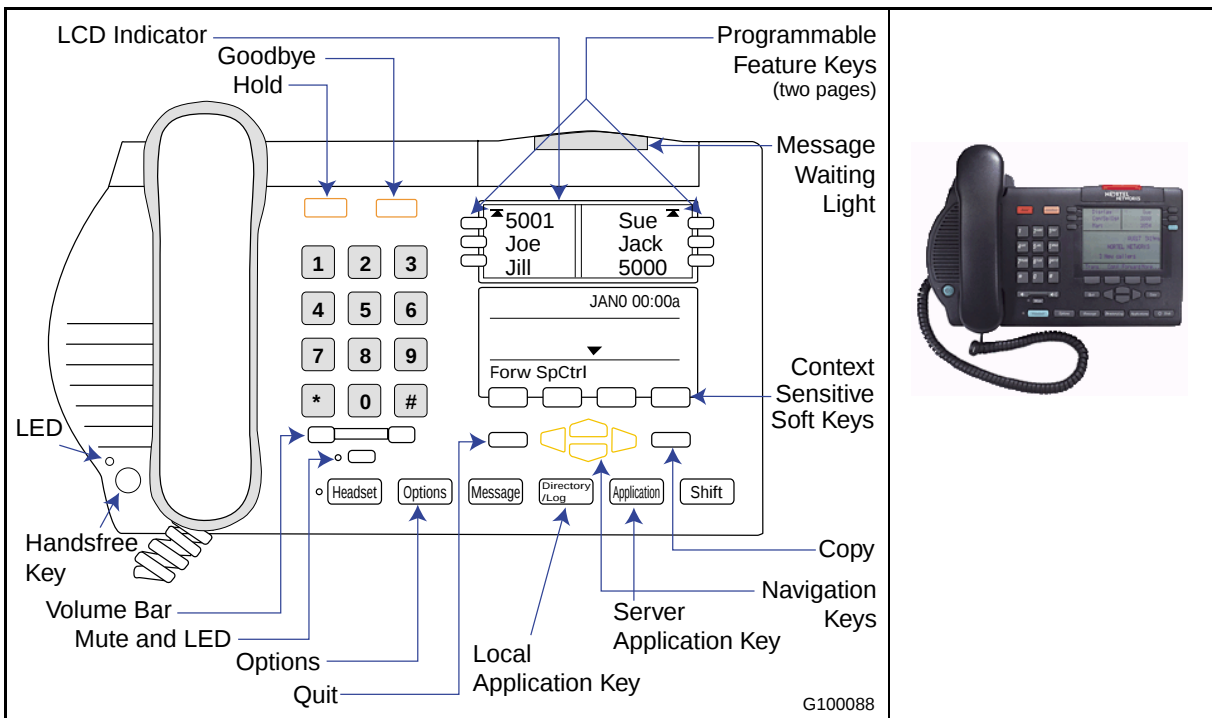

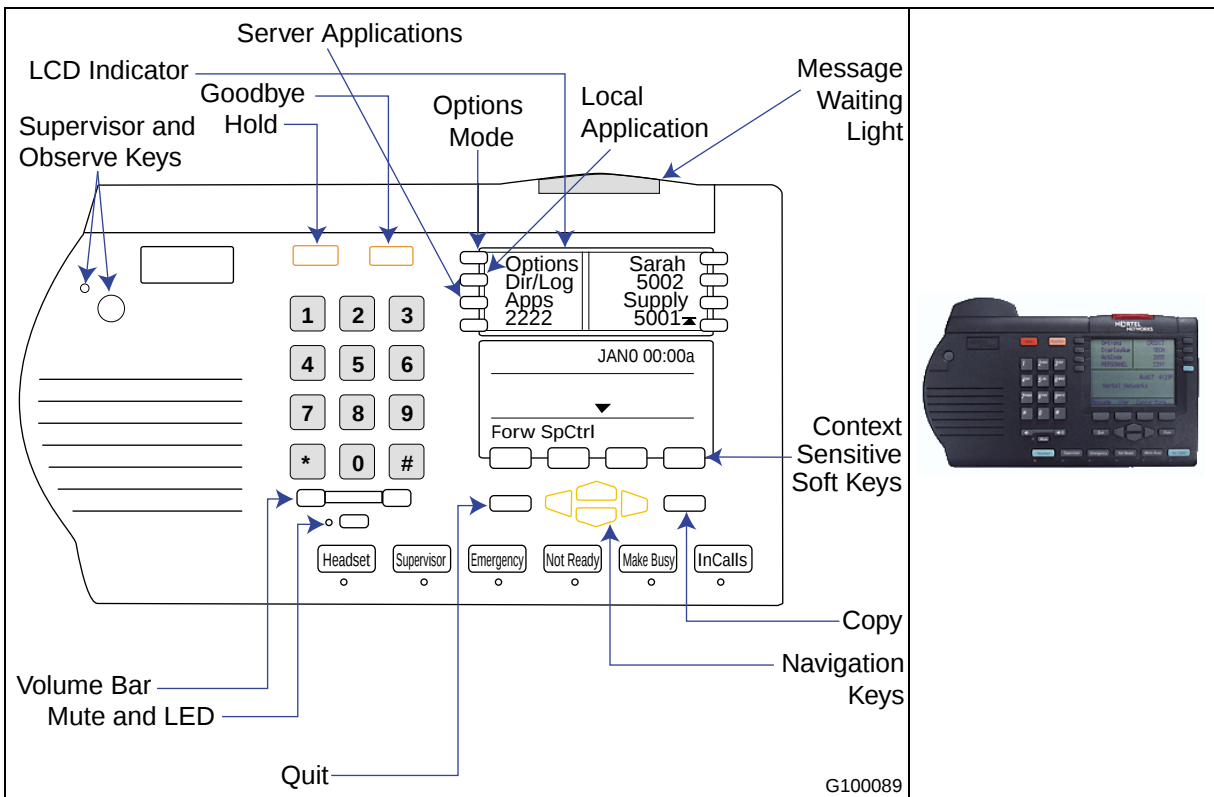

Accessory descriptions

Handset option for the M3905

The M3905 set supports a non-amplified headset or amplified headset using the headset jack. The handset can be added to the M3905 set by removing the front plate of the telephone. A handset kit is available for the M3905 set. The handset connects to the handset jack.

Alternate key caps for the M3905

The M3905 set provides an alternate key cap kit to customize the telephone. Use the Key Cap Tool with the M3905 set to remove the four middle programmable keys and replace them with alternate keys. The alternate key caps include: answer emergency, answer agent, activity, call agent, observe agent, and display queue.

Headset options

The M3901, M3902, M3904, and M3905 sets support an amplified headset when the headset connects to the handset jack.

The M3903, M3904 and M3905 sets have a dedicated headset jack which supports a non-amplified headset. The M3903, M3904 and M3905 have a headset fixed feature key to turn the headset on and off. Table 15 shows headsets that have been tested with the M3900 series sets.

Meridian External Alarmer and Recording Interface (MEARI)

The MEARI provides a remote ringer device installed in a location separate from the telephone. The MEARI provides access to a standard, off-the-shelf remote ringer, call status relay, audio recorder or visual indicator.

Program the MEARI interface to activate a ringer (or light) when the telephone rings, or activate a recorder when the telephone is in use. The MEARI requires an Accessory Connection Module (ACM).

MEARI connects to any M3900 set, except the M3901 which has no accessory dock. In order to use the MEARI accessory, the telephone must be equipped with the M3900 series ACM and power supply (purchased separately).

The MEARI provides relay contact outputs for both ringing and call status (off-hook condition) for activation of third-party peripheral products such as loud ringers or call-in-progress indicators. Additionally, the MEARI provides an audio output connection to voice recording equipment (as permitted by law).

The audio output level from the MEARI varies with handset, headset, and handsfree. Levels vary between local and remote speech, and between users. For this reason, voice recorders with automatic level control (ALC) circuitry provide the best quality recordings and uniform recorded speech level. This is especially true for recording handsfree conversations which provide the greatest range of speech level. The MEARI provides the following features:

- ring relay contact
- call status (off-hook) relay contact
- record audio

Since all three output signals operate independently, you can use the MEARI for more than one purpose, such as loud ringing, call in progress indication, and recording.

The MEARI does not require any software or system configuration.

Install the MEARI in the small dock of a M3902, M3903, M3904, or M3905 series set. There are three output connectors on the back of the MEARI cartridge. There is no need to disconnect the power supply from the telephone prior to insertion or extraction of the MEARI cartridge.

Analog Terminal Adapter (ATA)

The ATA connects an analog device such as a fax machine or modem to the telephone. This allows simultaneous use of the telephone and the analog device. The ATA is available for the M3902, M3903, M3904, and M3905 models. It requires an Accessory Connection Module.

Accessory Connection Module (ACM)

The ACM is an optional hardware module that installs into the telephone footstand. The ACM provides a port(s) to connect to the accessory cartridge interface.

Figure 7 shows the ACM being inserted in the footstand

The M3902 set has one accessory port. The M3903, M3904, and M3905 have two accessory ports. The plug-in cartridge allows the M3900 series sets to use the following accessories:

- ATA
- external alerter and recording interface

- full duplex handsfree cartridge (M3904 Release 3)

The M3901 set does not support the ACM.

Key-based Access Expansion Module (KBA)

The KBA has 22 keys which function as additional keys to the physical and self-labeled programmable feature keys on the M3900 series sets. You can use these additional keys as DN or feature keys. The sets and modules attach in such a way as they look and feel like one integrated unit. Only the M3904 and M3905 sets use the KBA.

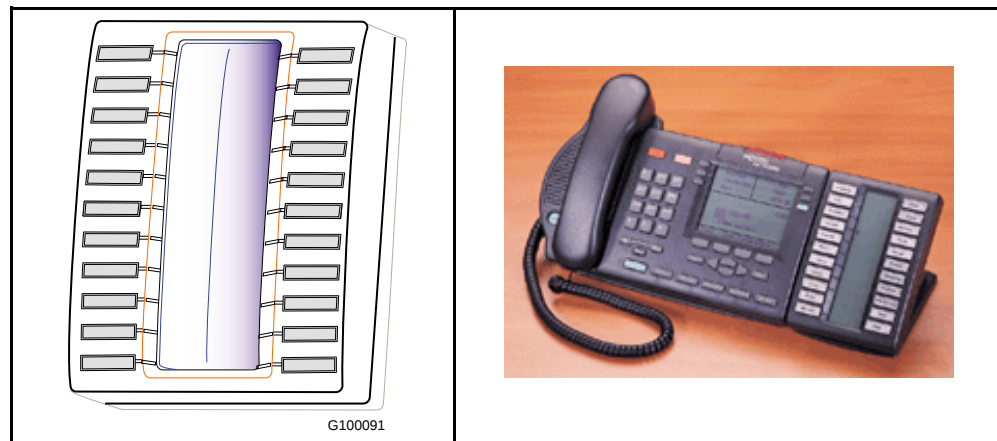
There are 32 keys on the M3904 and M3905 sets. The M3904 and M3905 sets support one or two KBAs with 22 keys each. With one KBA, the key numbers are from 1 to 54 with the first key mapping to key number 33. With two KBAs, the key numbers are from 1 to 76, with the first key on the second KBA mapping to Key 55.

Display-based Expansion Module (DBA)

The DBA is an optional add-on module for the M3904 and M3905 sets exclusively. The module attaches to a set to increase the number of programmable feature keys on the set by 24 for a total of 56 keys.

The DBA has keys 33-56 supporting up to three layers of eight programmable feature keys. It has eight self-labeled keys with the feature labels next to the key. A Page fixed-key allows switching between the three layers of self-programmable feature keys. The labels change according to the features programmed for the next logical set of feature keys shifting through the display. A visual indicator shows which page (or layer) of self-labeled programmable feature keys is in use.

Note: The first key of the DBA maps to Key 33. The user can change the feature key labels by selecting “Change feature key label” from the Options list on the M3904 or M3905.

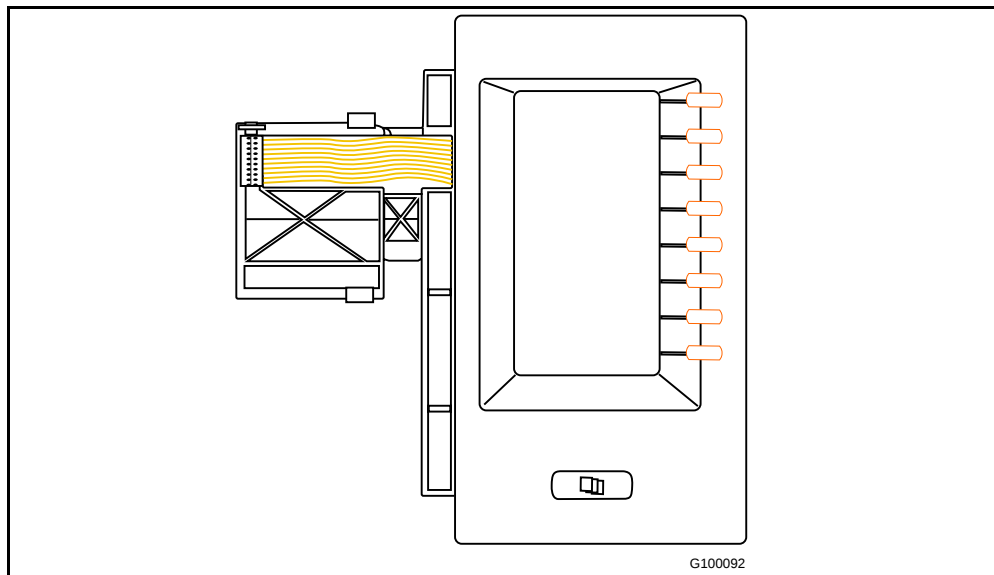

Use SERVORD commands to provision the DBA as a line option. Once a DBA has been added to a set, you can assign feature/DNs to the extra keys. The Meridian SL-100 uses a key map to download the DBA key assignments to the set. The DBA firmware handles the self-key labeling. The self-key label can be up to 10 characters in length.

Note: Only one DBA can be added onto a either an M3904 or M3905 set only. You cannot combine a DBA with a KBA.

Personal Directory PC Utility

The Personal Directory PC Utility provides a faster, easier way to create or modify a personal directory. Enter names and numbers into a personal directory file on a PC. Download the file directly from the PC to the M3904 or M3905 telephone. Upload a directory from the M3904 or M3905 set to a PC to modify the directory.

On the M3904, the PC and the set connect through a cartridge inserted into the telephone's ACM. The interface cartridge connects to the PC serial port through a serial cable. The personal directory PC utility requires an ACM installed in the telephone. The Personal Directory PC Utility cartridge is powered through the ACM. The ACM receives power through the telephone via the telephone line cord, which connects to a Teleadapt wall transformer power supply. The Personal Directory PC Utility is a small cartridge accessory which you can insert in either the small or large footstand opening.

Note: Purchase an RS232 serial cable for the PC connection separately. You require a 25-pin connector for the PC Utility.

With the Release 3 enhancements, the Personal Directory PC Utility supports 31-digit dialing and the pause character. If you have a previous version of the Personal Directory PC Utility, you can purchase the upgraded Personal Directory PC Utility software separately with the order code NTMN82BA.

Procedure 6

Install the M3900 Series Meridian digital telephones

- 1 Complete the wiring and cross-connections (loop power).
- 2 Connect the telephone to the connecting block.
- 3 Place the telephone upright on the desk in the normal operating position.
- 4 Perform the normal acceptance procedures.
- 5 Supply the user with a quick reference guide.



CAUTION

Before handling internal telephone components, you must discharge static electricity from your hands and tools by touching any grounded metal surface or conductor.

Telephone positions

Changing the telephone position

M3903, M3904 and M3905 sets have several height selections for the desktop positions. [Procedure 7 on page 74](#) shows how to change the telephone position.

Procedure 7 Change the telephone position

- 1 Press the bar at the top back side of the telephone.
- 2 With the position bar pressed in, raise or lower the telephone to the desired angle or height.
- 3 Release the bar to lock the telephone in the desired position.

Changing the telephone angle

The M3901 and M3902 Meridian Digital Telephones have three different angled height desktop positions.

Procedure 8 Change the telephone angle

- 1 Move the top of the footstand away from the telephone base (it has a snap connection).
- 2 Place the footstand in the desired position and snap the top of the footstand back into place.

This procedure is now complete

Wall mounting the telephone

The telephone wall mount bracket kit contains a one-piece wall-mount plate to attach the telephone to the wall using Procedure 9.

Procedure 9 Wall mount the telephone

- 1 Place the wall-mount bracket against the wall and mark the spot to insert the screws.
Note: The M3901 and M3902 have built-in wall-mount brackets.
- 2 Screw the five screws in and leave about 3 1/2 mm (1/8 inch) between the head of the screw and wall.
- 3 Remove the footstand from the telephone by sliding the footstand down (using the plastic hinges) about 7 mm (1/4 inch).
- 4 Swing the footstand away from the telephone base and remove the telephone.
- 5 Attach the wall-mount bracket onto the back of the telephone by placing the telephone at the top edge of the wall-mount bracket and sliding the telephone into place.
- 6 Mount the wall-mount bracket, that is attached to the telephone, onto the screws located on the wall.

This procedure is now complete

Headset consideration

Test the headset with the telephone before use. In a noisy environment, an amplified headset is an option. When using the amplified headset, there are two choices of volume control: the rocker control on the telephone and the switch on the headset. The user should adjust the telephone volume, before adjusting the headset volume.

To provide the best communication with the least amount of distortion, the amplifier should have a higher setting than the telephone volume control.

Refer to your representative for the latest product bulletin from Nortel Networks recommending headset types for use with the M3900 Series digital telephone.

Accessory Connection Module (ACM)

The following steps explain how to install the ACM.

Procedure 10 Install the ACM

- 1 Press the release latch on the back of the telephone.
- 2 Pull the footstand away from the back of the telephone.
- 3 Disconnect the line cord from the base of the telephone.
- 4 Move the telephone down 7 mm (1/4 inch), then use the hinges to swing the telephone footstand away from the base of the telephone.
- 5 Snap the ACM into the rectangular opening in the telephone footstand.
- 6 Plug the ACM cable connector into the back of the telephone.
- 7 Place the ACM attached ribbon cable into the track running down the telephone base.
- 8 Snap the plastic cable cover in place over the ACM ribbon cable.
- 9 Connect the line cord into the base of the telephone.
- 10 Connect the hinges to the telephone base and swing the footstand back in place.
- 11 Snap the footstand into a fixed position.
- 12 Return the telephone to its original position.

This procedure is now complete

Installing the ACM into the footstand

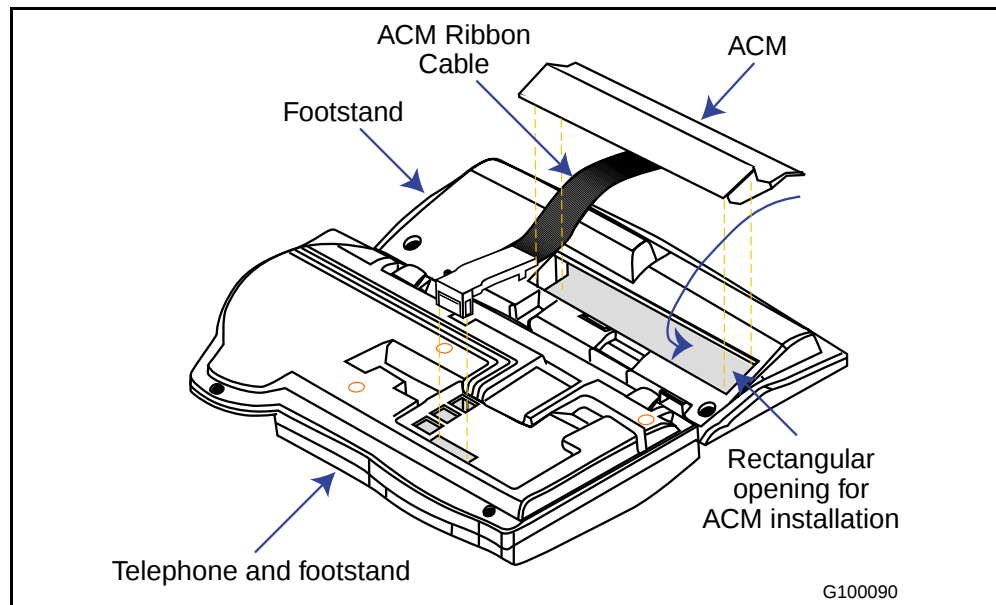
There is a cut out on the base of the footstand which displays the ACM connector ports. When ready to attach an accessory, insert the appropriate cartridge into the port slot. There is one accessory port available on the M3902. There are two accessory ports available on the M3903, M3904, and M3905.

Note 1: The accessories you attach to the telephone must be compatible. [Table 16 on page 77](#) shows accessory compatibility.

Note 2: You require a wall transformer to power accessory cartridges. The transformer does not come with the ACM unit. Contact your Nortel Networks representative to order the ACM compatible wall transformer (NTMN80AA).

Figure 10 shows the installation of the ACM into the telephone footstand.

There are two accessory ports on the back of the terminal footstand. Each port supports one cartridge accessory. You cannot use two accessories that require the same port type at the same time. For example, you cannot use two accessories that require a serial port connection at the same time. The shape and size of the plug in the accessory cartridge prevents the user from accidentally connecting incompatible accessories.

To check the compatibility of accessories, see Table 16 before buying optional hardware.

Analog Terminal Adapter (ATA)

Procedure 11 describes how to install and use the ATA with your M3900 series set.

The ATA allows an off-the-shelf analog device (FAX, modem, or analog telephone (500/2500)) to work simultaneously with your M3902, M3903, M3904, or M3905 Meridian Digital Telephone. The M3901 set does not support the ATA.

Install the ACM into your M3900 Series set (see Procedure 11), before you install your ATA. The ACM provides connection capabilities between the M3902, M3903, M3904, and M3905 telephones and the ATA.

Procedure 11 Install the ATA

- 1 Insert the ATA accessory cartridge into the ACM. The latch should be at the top.
- 2 Connect the commercial device you have selected to use, either your FAX machine, modem, or analog (500/2500) telephone, to the connection on your ATA cartridge interface.

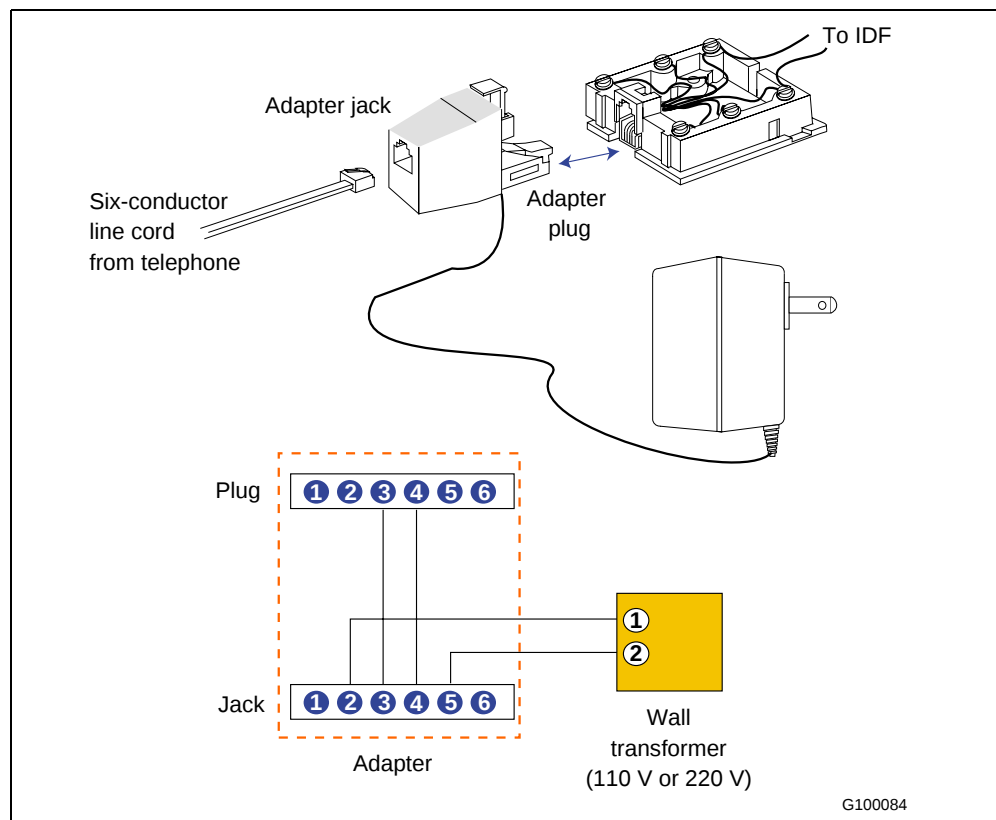
78 Installation

- 3 Plug the transformer into the electrical outlet (use only the transformer designed for your ACM accessories).
Note: The wall transformer for M3900 accessories is NTMN80AA (CPC A0779713) 110v Wall Transformer (M3900 series). It attaches between the telephone line cord and the telephone walljack.
- 4 Connect the Adapter plug, attached to your transformer, into the wall jack.
- 5 Connect the six-conductor line cord from the telephone to the Adapter jack attached to your ACM accessory transformer.
- 6 Refer to the manufacturer's documentation for complete installation and configuration instructions for your external analog device (FAX machine, modem, or 500/2500 telephone).

This procedure is now complete

Note: The ATA supports connections to POTS services only. Features such as Message Waiting, Switchhook Flash/Link, Transfer, Conference, and CLASS type services are not supported on the attached device.

A red LED status light located on the ATA indicates the status of the ATA as follows:

- **Flashing red** – indicates that the ATA is operating normally. For more troubleshooting guidelines, refer to the user documentation that came with your analog device.
- **Solid red** – indicates that the ATA is not operating normally.
- **Red light off** – indicates that there is no power going to the ATA or the unit is not operating correctly. Check the power connections to the ATA.

Flexible voice and data capabilities allow you to have continuous use of both the Meridian Digital Telephone and the attached analog device. Your system administrator configures the flexible voice and data capabilities for your telephone on the system equipment. Contact your system administrator for more information about flexible voice and data capability.

When there is a power failure to the ATA, the Analog Device does not store or keep information (for example, outgoing FAX from your FAX machine). You must send the information again when power returns.

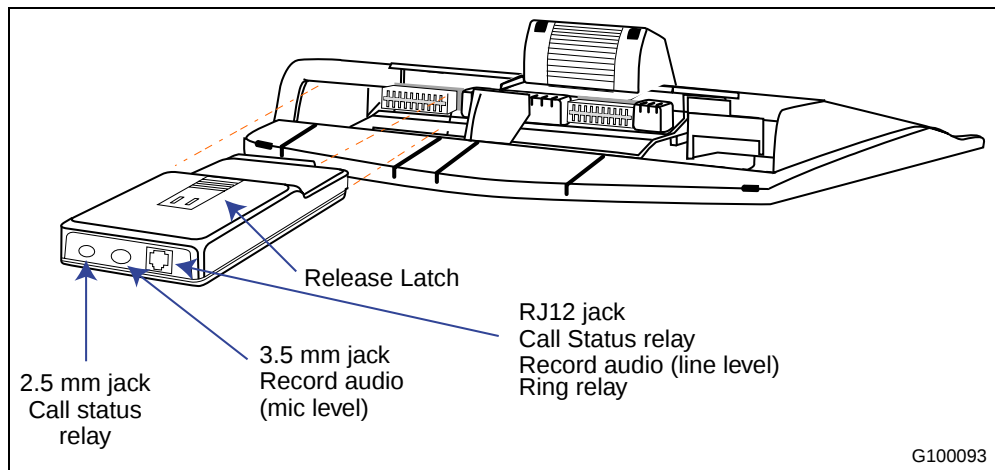

Meridian External Alerter and Recording Interface (MEARI)

Install the MEARI in the small dock of a M3902, M3903, M3904, or M3905 set. There are three output connectors on the back of the MEARI cartridge. There is no need to disconnect the power supply from the telephone prior to insertion or extraction of the MEARI cartridge.

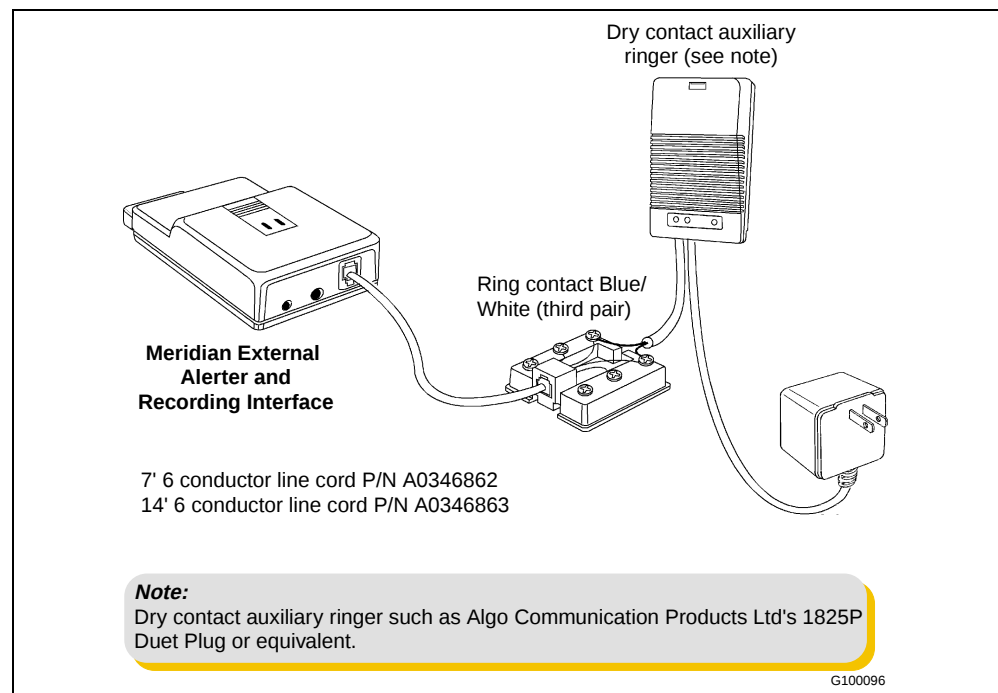

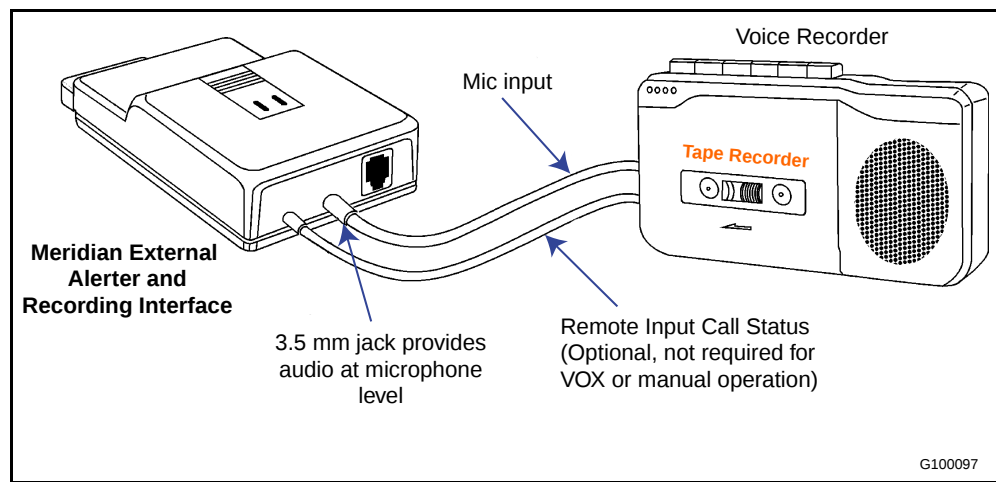
Loud ringer connected to the MEARI through the RJ12 jack

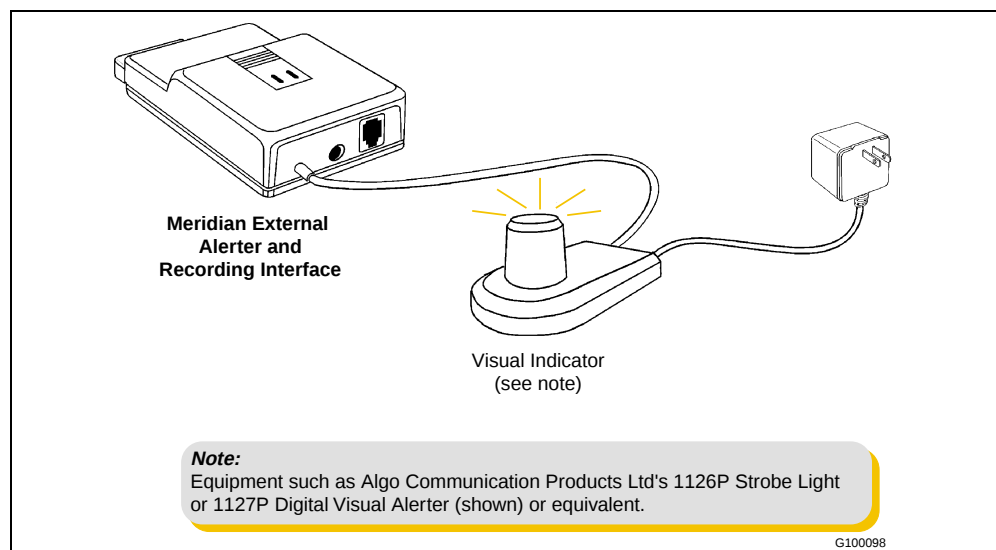

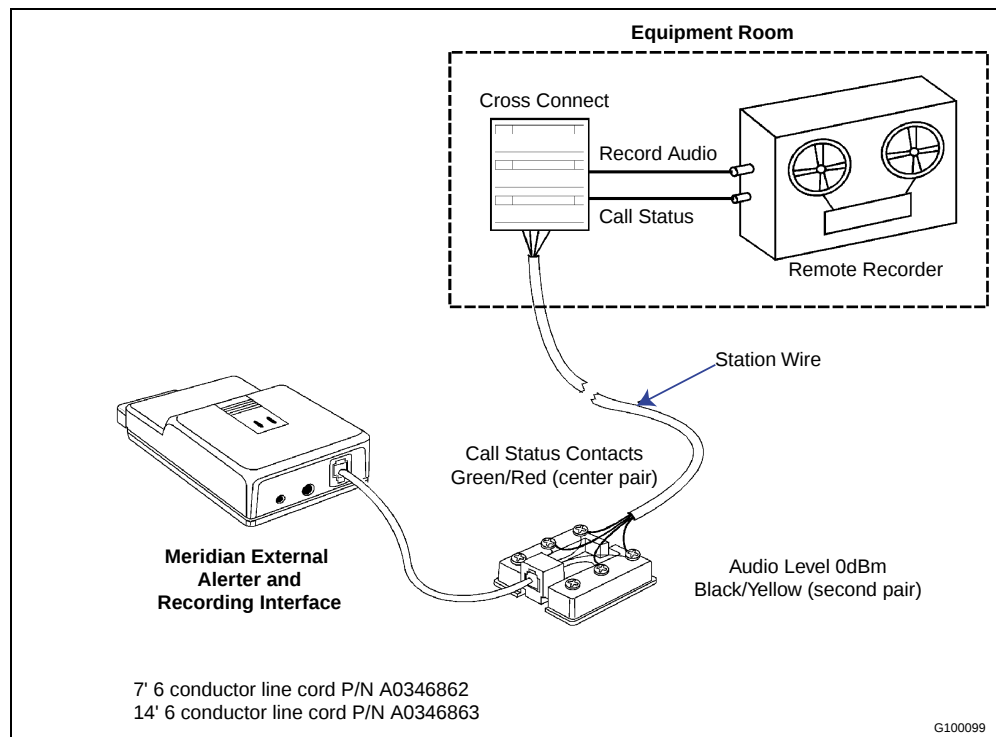

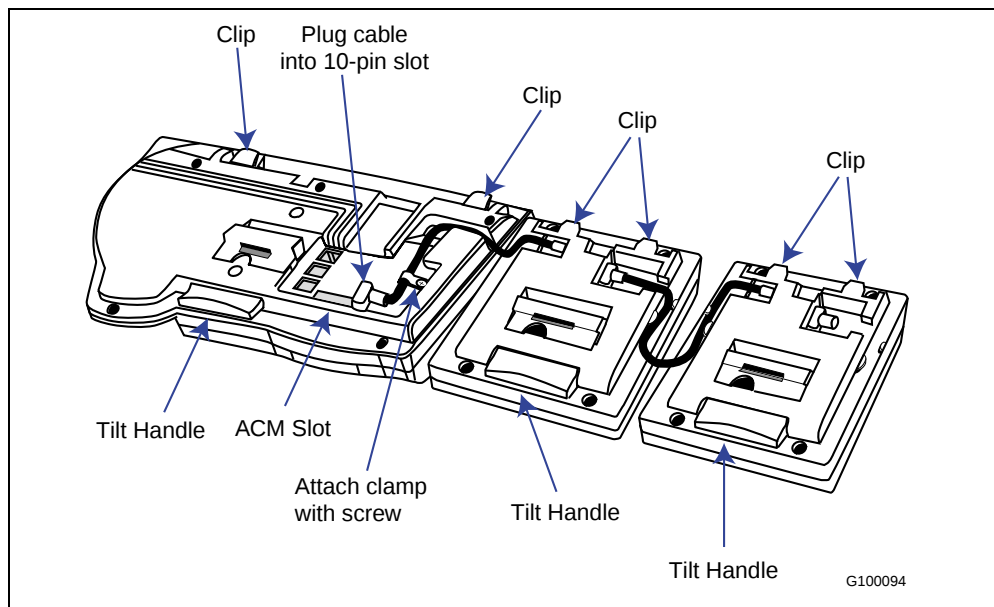

Key-based Expansion Module Accessory (KBA)

The Key-based Expansion Module provides 22 additional keys for the M3904 and the M3905 telephones. You can add a second Key-based Expansion Module, for a total of 44 additional line/feature keys (see Figure 17). To install the KBA (NTMN37BA), you need to order the Key-based Expansion Module Kit 1 (NTMN38AB), which includes the single KBA footstand assembly. If you add a second KBA, you also need to order the Key-based Expansion Module Kit 2 (NTMN38BA), which includes the expansion KBA footstand assembly.

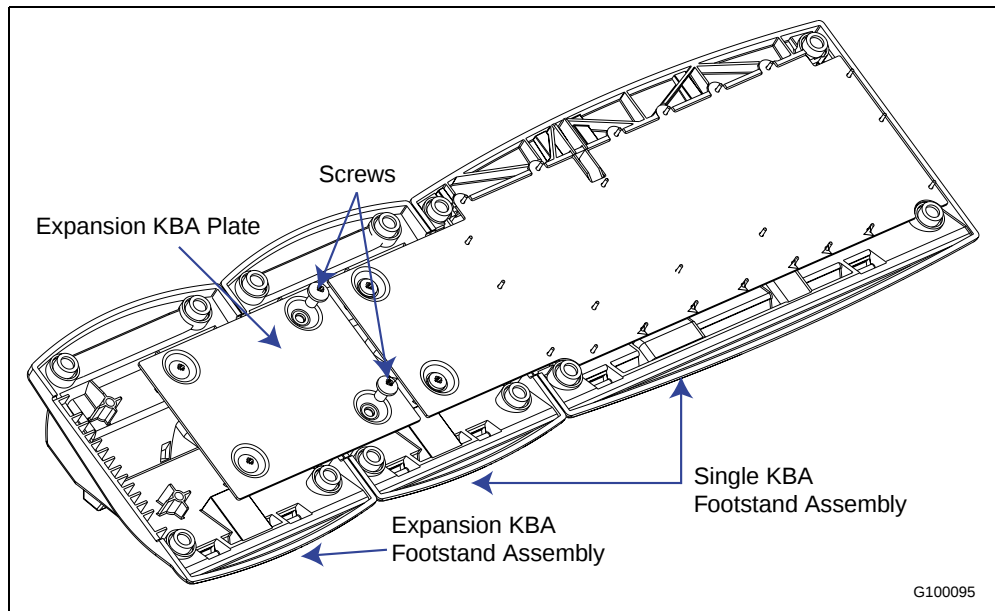

Personal Directory PC Utility

The Personal Directory PC Utility provides a faster, easier way to create or modify a personal directory. Users can enter names and numbers into a Personal Directory file on their PC. Users can download (program) the file directly from the PC to the M3904 or M3905 set. Users can also upload (read) a directory from the M3904 or M3905 set to a PC and modify the directory.

You can access online help by clicking on **Help** on the Main Menu bar.

The Personal Computer and the M3904 or M3905 set connect through a cartridge inserted into the telephone's ACM. The interface cartridge connects to the PC serial port through a serial cable. The Personal Directory PC Utility requires that you have an ACM installed in your telephone (see [Procedure 10 on page 75](#)).

The user supplies the serial cable for the PC connection. [Procedure 19 on page 89](#) describes how to set up the Personal Directory PC Utility interface.

Procedure 19 Set up the Personal Directory PC Utility interface

- 1 Insert the interface cartridge into either the small, or large, port on the ACM in your M3904 or M3905 telephone set. The latch must be at the top.

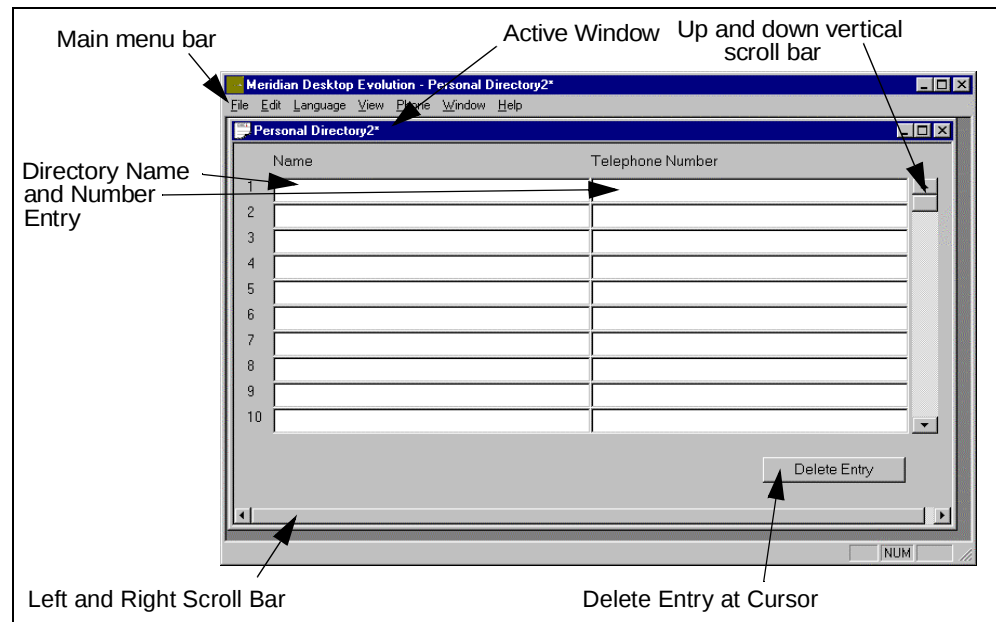

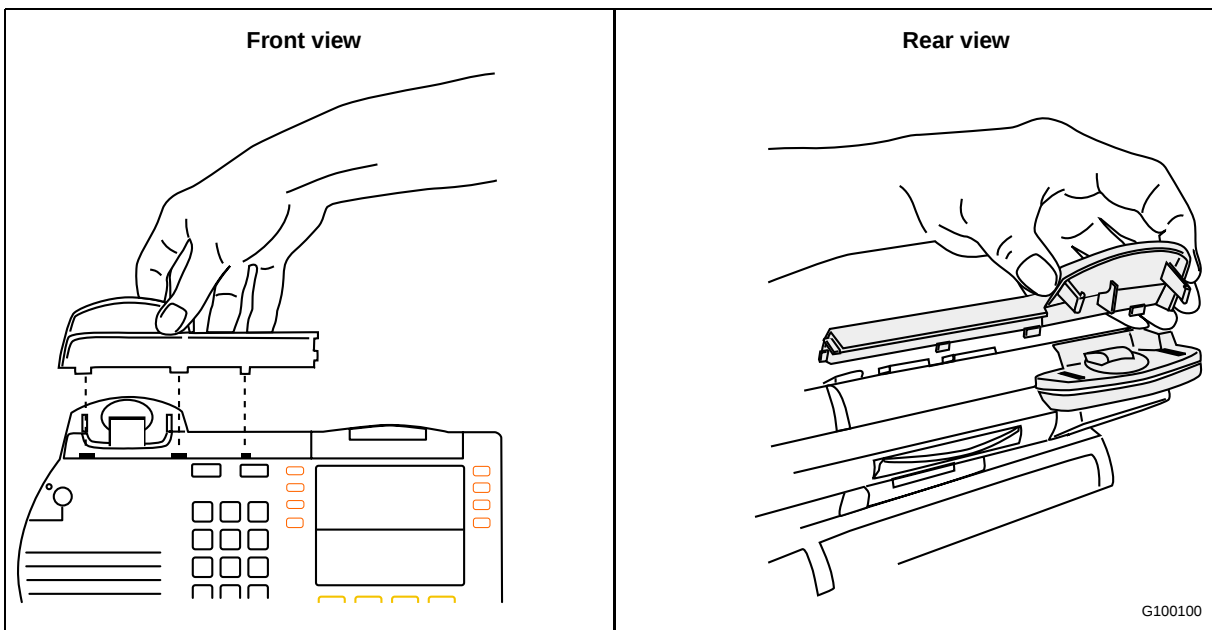

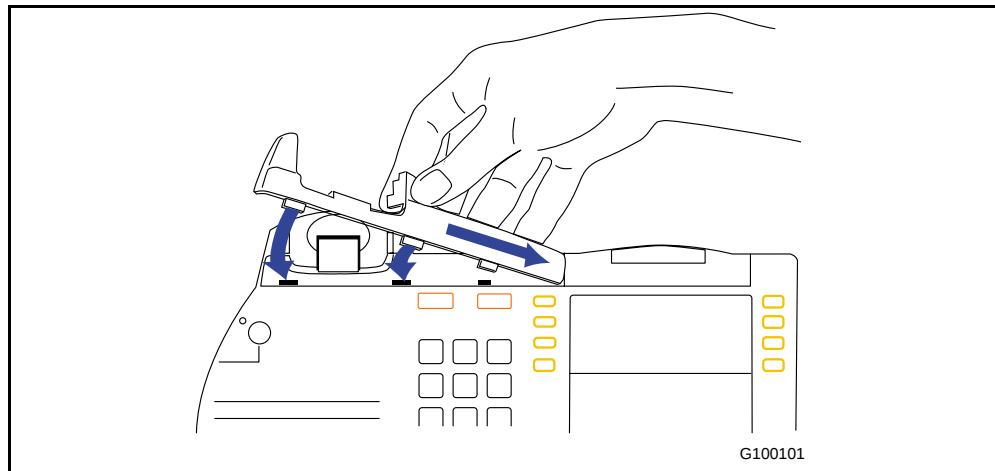

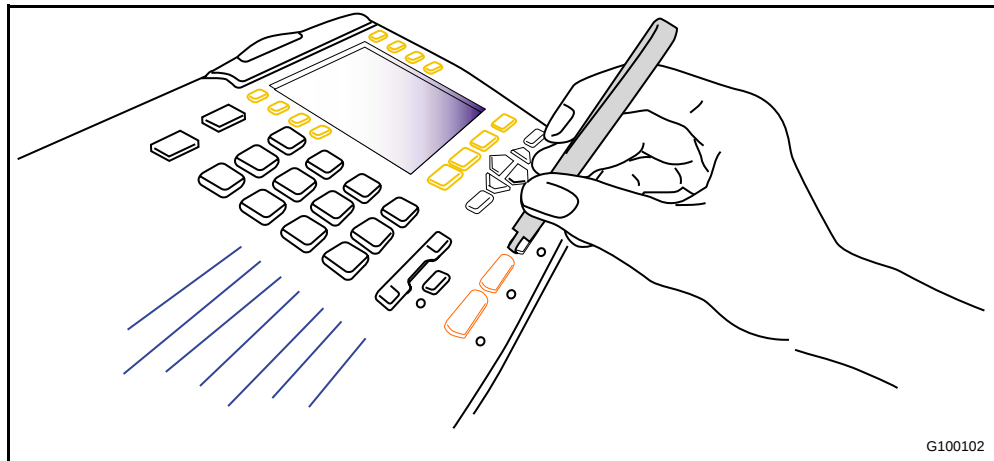

You must install an Accessory Connection Module (NTMN71AA) into your M3904 set before you install the FDHF cartridge. The ACM provides connection capabilities between the M3904 set and the FDHF cartridge. [Procedure 10 on page 75](#) provides ACM installation instructions.

Procedure 38 Connect the FHDF cartridge

- 1 Look at the label on the back of the set to make sure that your set is an M3904 Release 3. For Release 3, the label shows NTMN34GA. If the set is not a Release 3 vintage, the FDHF cartridge is not compatible. Contact your network administrator for more information.
- 2 Insert the FDHF cartridge into the ACM. The latch must be at the top.
- 3 Plug the wall transformer into an electrical outlet (use only the transformer designed for your ACM accessory). The following list shows the transformers Nortel Networks approves for use with the FDHF 110V wall transformer (NTMN80AA) cartridge.
- 4 Disconnect the telephone line cord from the telephone wall jack. This is similar to the ATA (see Figure 2 on page 6).
- 5 Connect the Adapter plug, attached to your transformer, to the telephone wall jack.
- 6 Connect the telephone line cord to the wall transformer adapter jack.
- 7 Verify that the FDHF cartridge is working properly. The cartridge is operating properly when:
 - the red LED on the cartridge is flashing, and
 - the volume bar displays 18 segments during handsfree volume adjustment.

Note: Half-duplex mode displays only 12 segments.

This procedure is now complete

Operating parameters

The M3904 set attenuates the receive audio level when in FDHF mode while both you and the other party are conversing; therefore, you can notice fluctuations in the receive volume during a FDHF call.

During a call, you can remove or insert the FDHF cartridge into the ACM without interrupting the established call. If you remove the FDHF cartridge, the set returns to half-duplex operation.

Status light indicator

A red LED status light on the FDHF cartridge indicates the status of the cartridge as follows:

- **Flashing red** – the cartridge is operating normally.
- **Solid red** – the cartridge is not operating normally. Contact your network administrator.
- **Red light off** – there is no power going to the cartridge or the cartridge is not operating correctly. Check the power connection to the cartridge. If the condition continues, contact your network administrator.

Firmware download process overview

The M3900 firmware download process provides information regarding the capability to download new firmware versions to the M3900 series digital telephones. Firmware download provides a way for installed M3900 telephones to be updated to the appropriate firmware release level on the Meridian SL-100. The latest generally available firmware files are available at no charge on the Nortel Networks web site for Meridian SL-100 customers.

Firmware downloads use the flash download procedure that provides the capability to download a new firmware version to the M3900 series digital telephones. See [“Flash download” on page 19](#) and in the *Feature Description Manual*, NTP 555-4031-801. Nortel Networks Optivity Telephony Manager for Meridian SL-100 2.0 initiates all flash download commands. Nortel Networks Optivity Telephony Manager for Meridian SL-100 2.0 is a requirement for M3900 series digital telephones.

Firmware files location

Use the Procedure 40 to download a firmware file from the Nortel Networks web site and place the downloaded file onto the Meridian SL-100 SLM drive.

Nortel Networks Optivity Telephony Manager for Meridian SL-100, 2.0, (OTM-MSL) provides firmware management for the M3900 series digital telephones: M3902, M3903, M3904, and M3905. The firmware download process is executed in OTM-MSL using the Expec controller card (NT7D07BA) in the EIPE.

Note: Since there is no upgradeable firmware load for the M3901 set, the M3901 set is not supported with this tool.

OTM-MSL enables the user to:

- view firmware loads on the connected EIPE
- initiate the transfer of M3900 firmware to the EIPE
- delete firmware loads from the EIPE
- view the space remaining on the EIPE for M3900 firmware loads
- initiate the transfer of a firmware file to multiple EIPEs
- provide the same FTP functionality as the Expec Service
- determine the location and access to the FTP server (FTP server requirements and options)
- view descriptions of the EIPE file system, requirements, and limitations

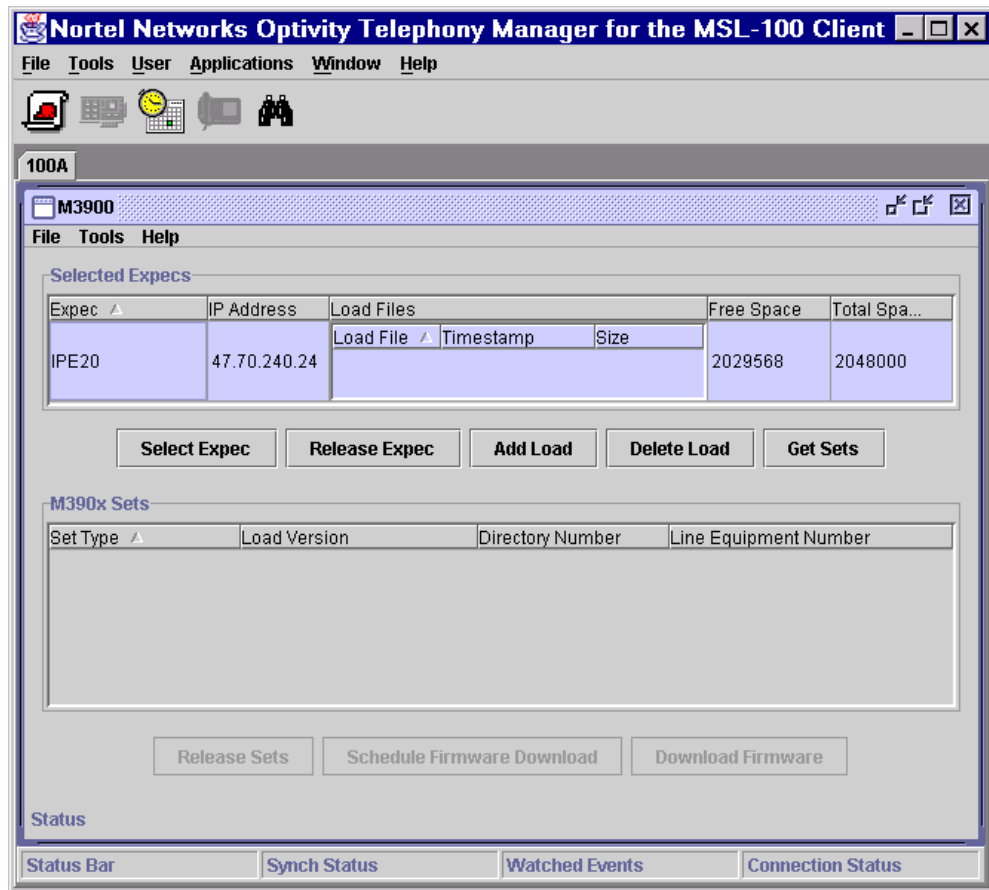
Through this tool, M3900 firmware loads can be downloaded to one M3900 series set or to all M3900 terminals of the same type on an EIPE. The same can be done for multiple EIPEs. The transfer and downloads of firmware to a single or multiple EIPEs can be scheduled to execute at a later time.

Using the M3900 Firmware Management main window, the user can access information such as the following:

- scheduling capabilities and limitations (that is, the ability to schedule the download of the Firmware to M3900 sets)
- network considerations
- transfer results and recovery (the system generates a log file after each firmware download session is complete)
- generate a record of the completion of each firmware load operation

[Figure 23 on page 108](#) shows the M3900 Firmware Maintenance main window and toolbar items.

The top half of the M3900 tool main window is used to reserve the Expects for load operations, to transfer M3900 firmware loads to Expects, and to select M3900 sets for downloading. The same file servers and method for selecting them that is used for the Expec Load tool is also used for the M3900 tool. Once file servers are defined in the OTM-MSL server, M3900 load files can be selected. The correct file name and type should be verified to make sure it is a valid M3900 firmware load, before transferring it to any EIPE.

Once M3900 sets are listed in the bottom half of the window, the **Download Firmware** or **Schedule Firmware Download** buttons are used for the actual downloading. All scheduled firmware download tasks can be viewed in the Scheduler tool (see [Figure 35 on page 121](#)). All active M3900 jobs can be viewed in the Active Jobs Status tool (see [Figure 33 on page 119](#)) found under the Tool menus of the M3900 tools window (see [Figure 36 on page 122](#)).

M3900 firmware download process

The M3902, M3903, M3904, and M3905 sets can be upgraded to the latest firmware available. The Expec in the EIPE does the firmware upgrade process. The Nortel Networks Optivity Telephony Manager for Meridian SL-100, 2.0 (OTM-MSL) server coordinates and logs this process. The OTM-MSL client controls what the server does.

Only one type of set (that is, M3902, M3903, M3904, or M3905) per Expec can be upgraded at any one time. Since OTM-MSL can communicate with multiple Expecs at the same time, this allows multiple sets throughout the Meridian SL-100 system to be upgraded at the same time. Multiple download sessions can be scheduled to allow for different types of sets to be upgraded.

The download process is as follows:

1. New firmware is placed on the Meridian SL-100 SLM drive.
2. A group (must be same set type, that is, all M3903s) of sets on an Expec are selected.
3. The OTM-MSL server telnets into the Expec.
4. The Expec FTPs into the Meridian SL-100.
5. The firmware is copied to the Expec's RAM.
6. The sets in the group are individually checked for "idle state", before the download starts.

TIP: If a set has any buttons pressed or is off hook, the process aborts and the system checks the next set for "idle state".

7. The Expec erases the current Firmware from the set.

Note: The set is now out-of-service for 15-45 minutes. There is visual notification of the process on the set.

8. The upgrade process starts.
9. When that set is finished, a message is sent to the Expec stating the firmware version.
10. The Expecs then checks the next set for "idle state", erases the current firmware from the set, and the upgrade process starts.
11. Steps 6-9 are repeated until all the selected sets are upgraded.

Note: Some sets may not successfully upgrade. Should that occur, you need to download firmware to those sets again.

12. The OTM-MSL server will save all the Expec messages during the process into a log file and display in real-time in the Active Job Status window (see [Figure 33 on page 119](#)).
13. When the upgrade is complete, the OTM-MSL server removes the Firmware from the Expec RAM and logs off the Expecs.

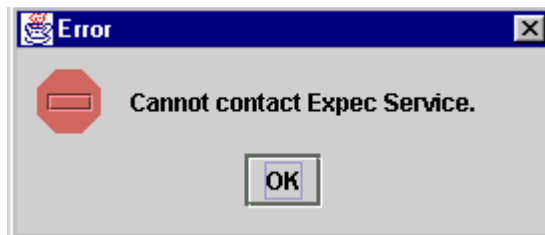

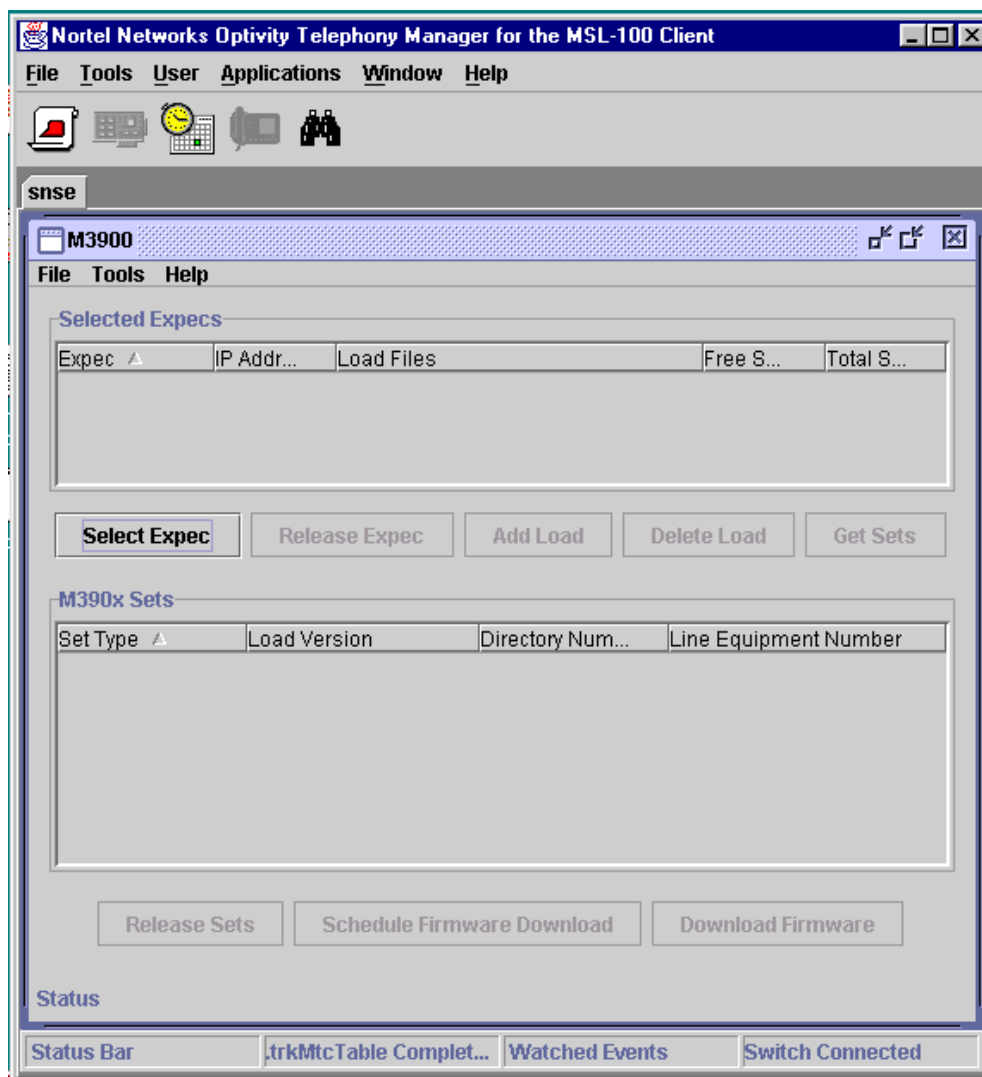

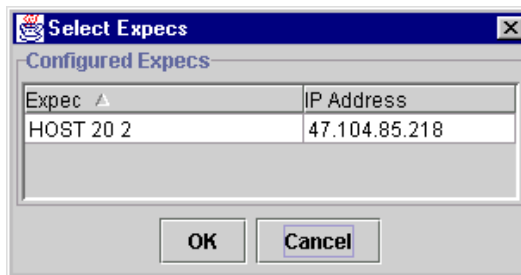

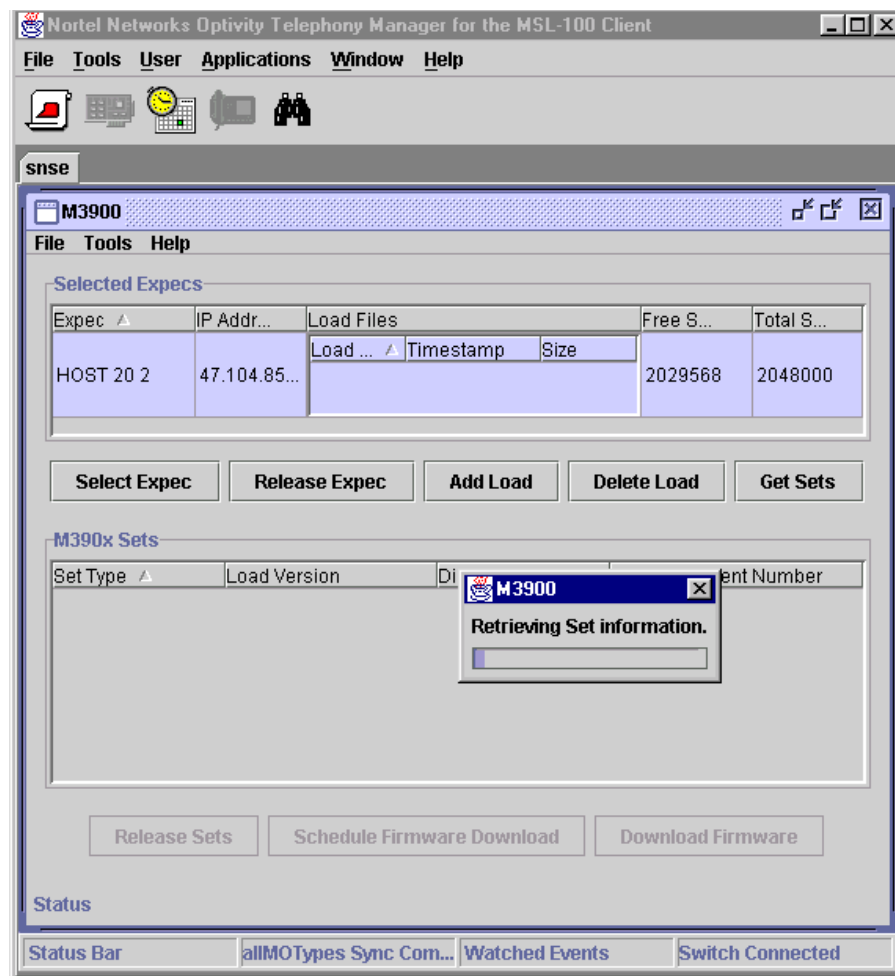

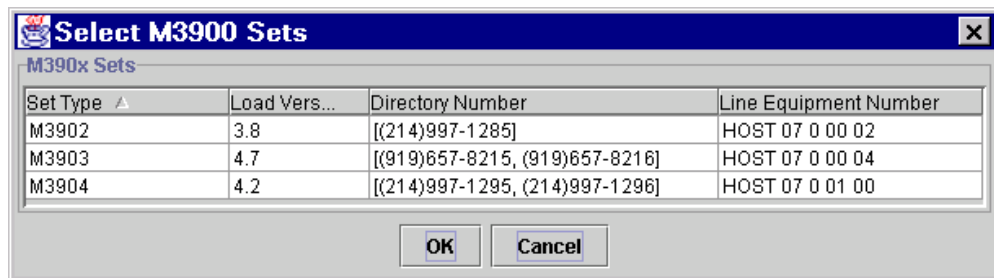

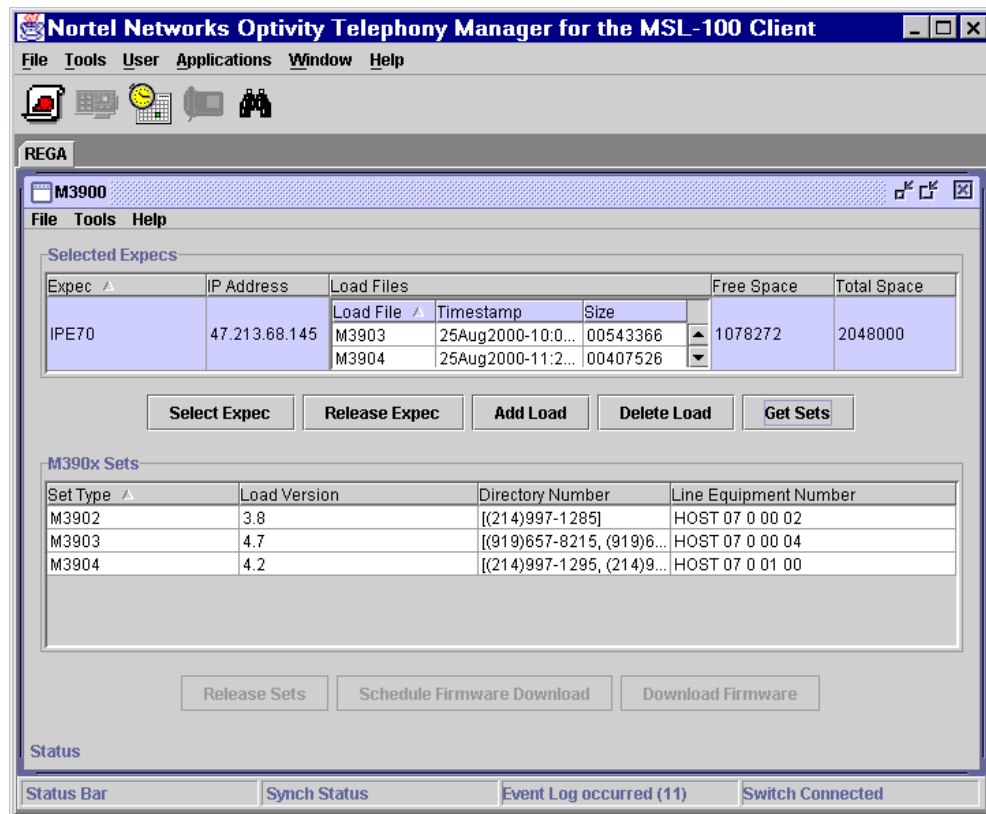

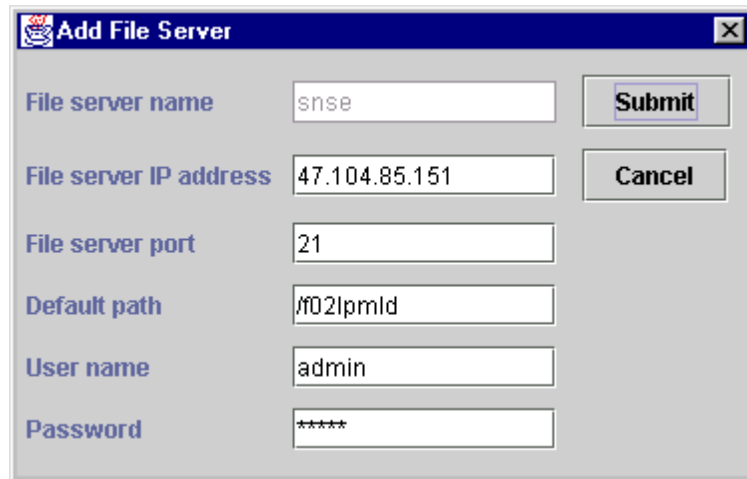

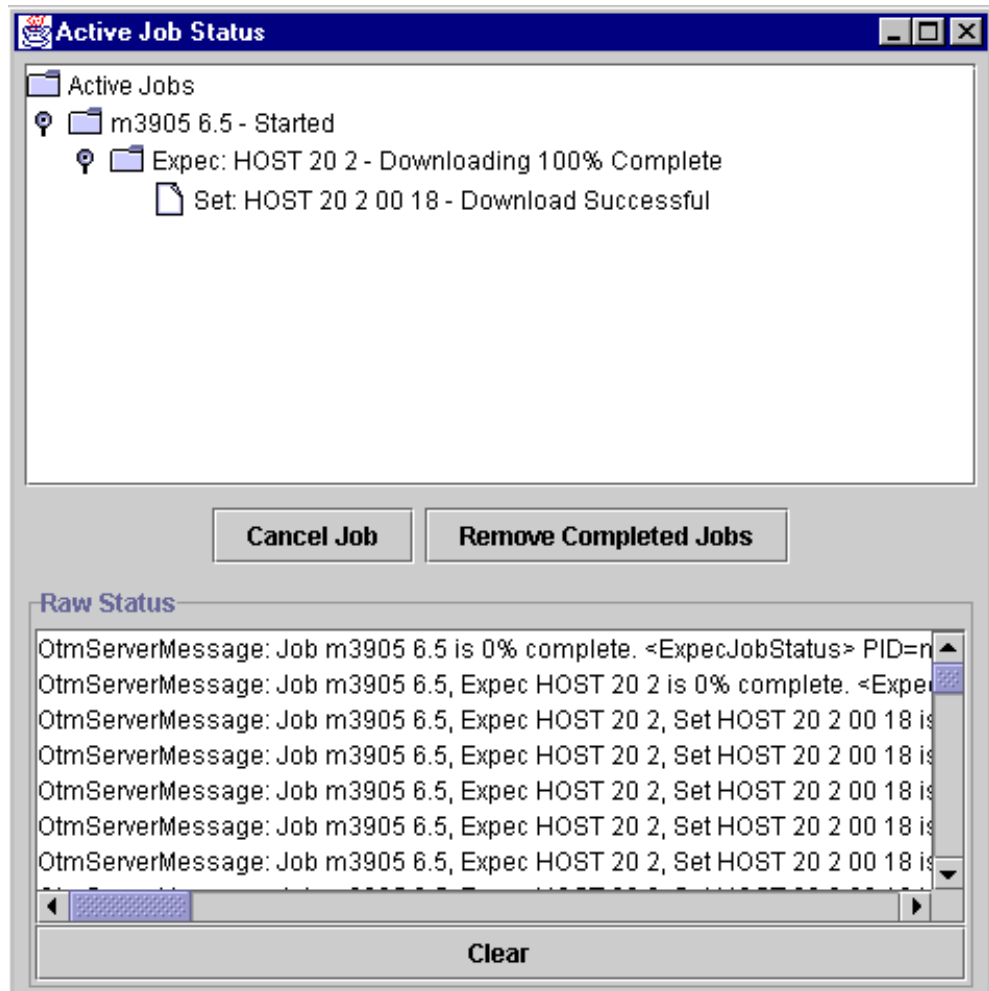

View current status of any upgrades from the Tools Menu

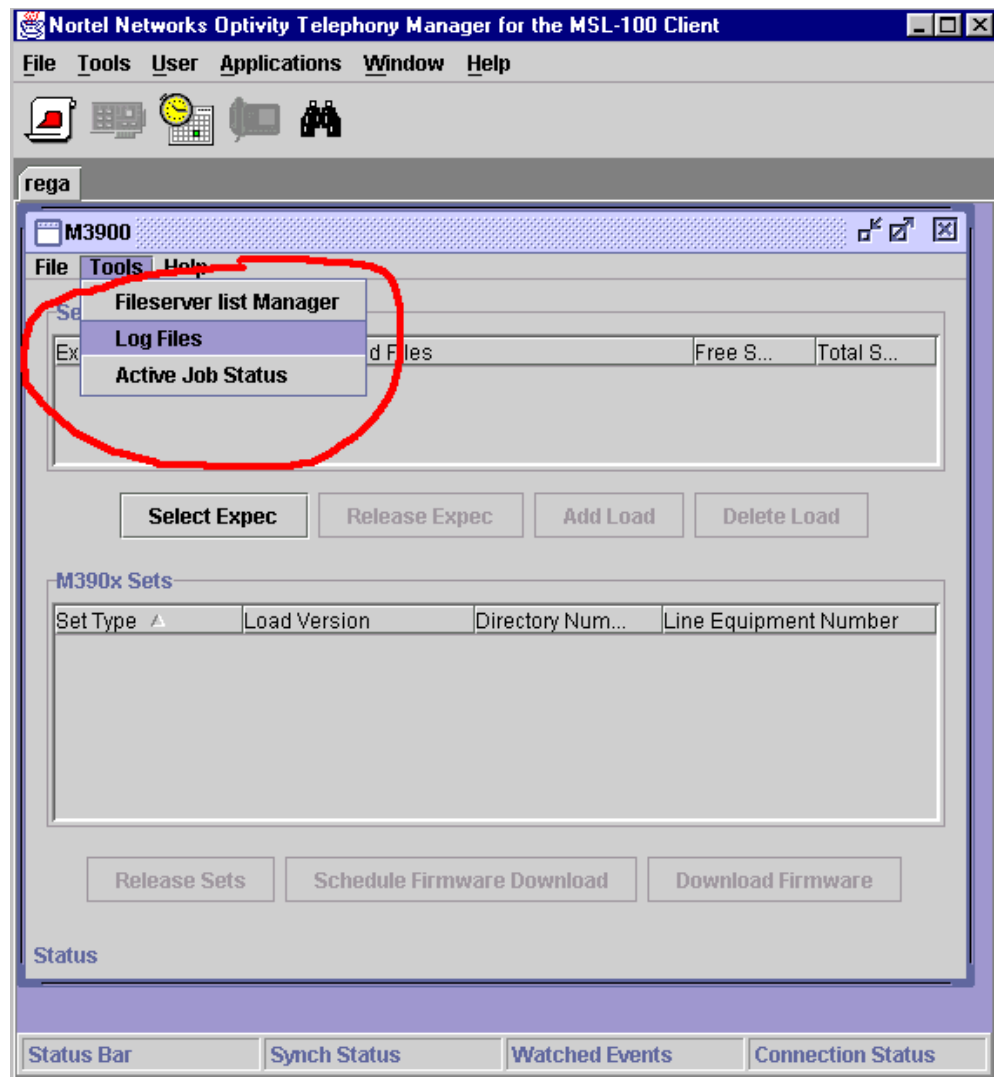
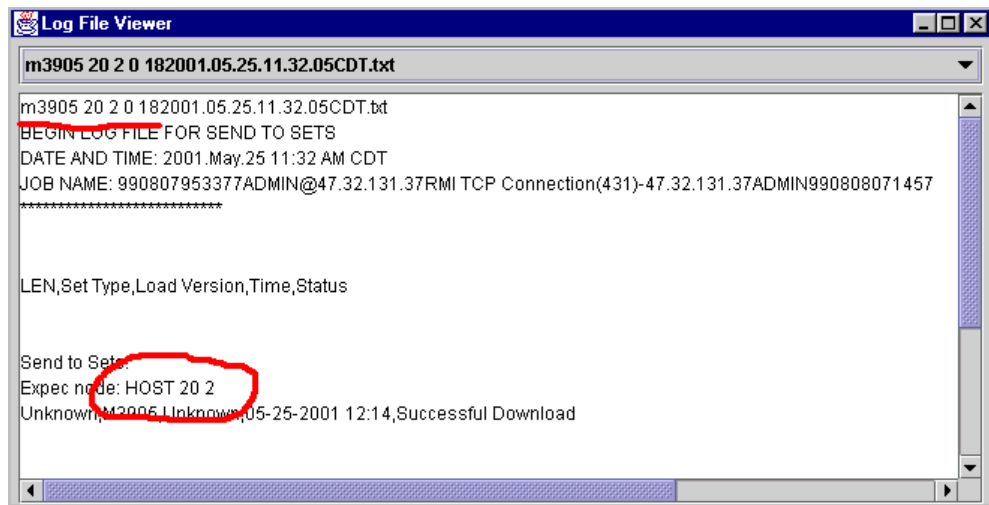
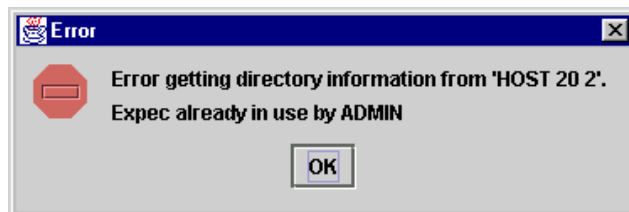

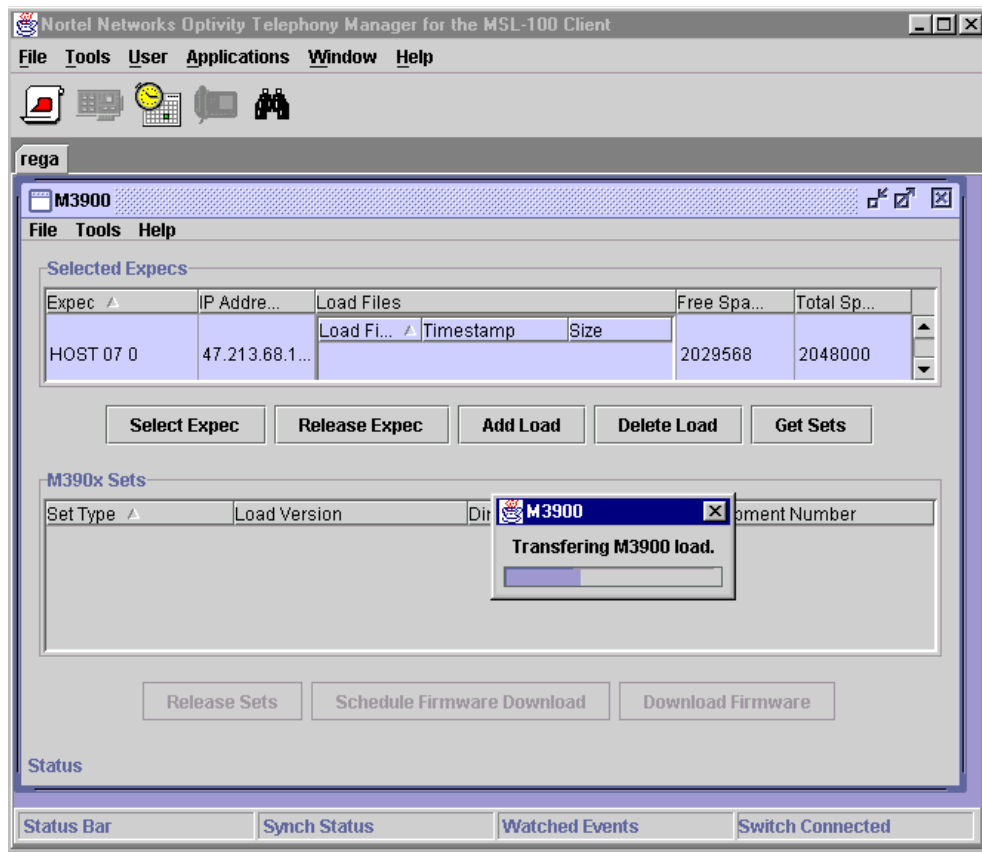

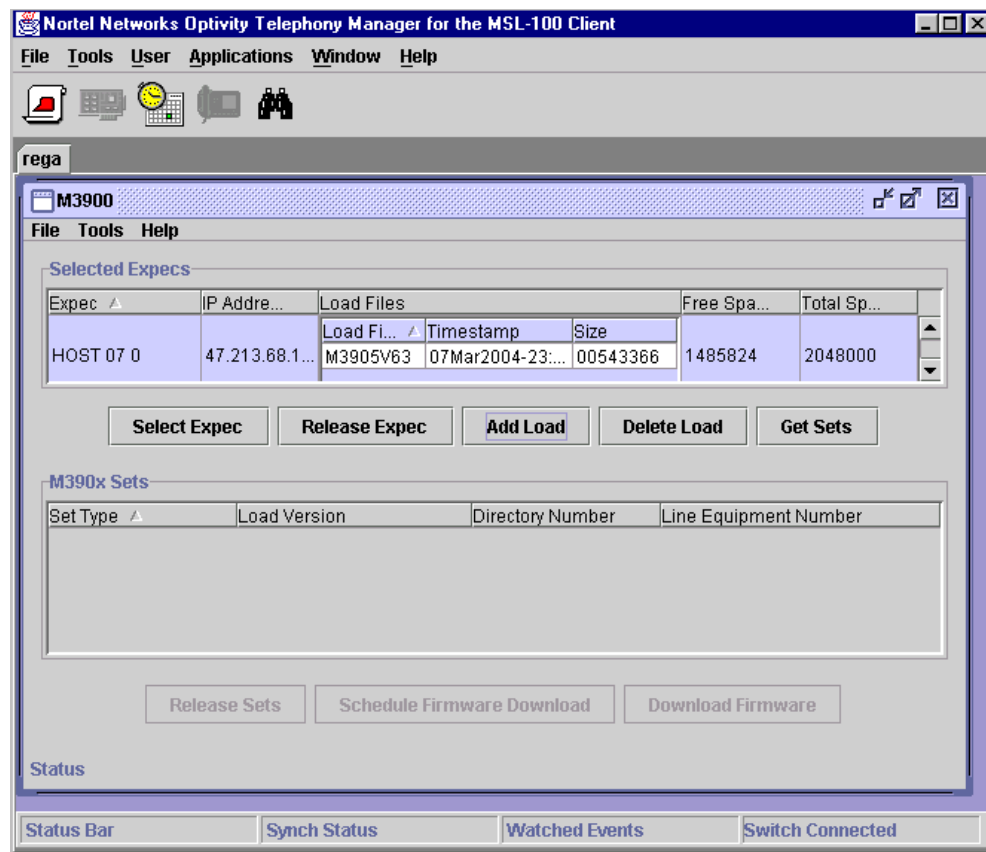

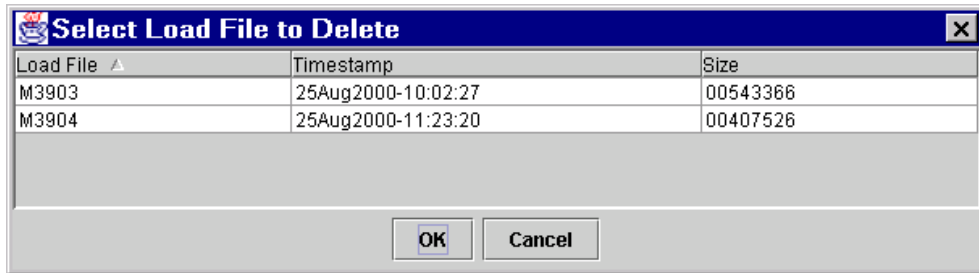
